### Co-Presidents' Message

WFOP's members were out in full force for the Spring conference April 28-29 in Oshkosh, our largest turnout in several years. Some 95 members and guests were in attendance for a series of talks and conversations about "The Work of Poetry." Among the conference's highlights were readings and presentations on craft by Wisconsin's new poet laureate Nick Gulig and keynoter Amorak Huey. Chapbook and Muse Prizes also were given out. (See elsewhere in this issue for mention of the winners.) Special thanks to co-Vice Presidents Mike Gadzik and Thom Singleton and all their volunteers for a beautifully conceived and orchestrated program.

Our next conference will be in Sheboygan, tentatively April 26-28 2024. Although we're now holding only one full conference a year, we'll be working to create more activities on a regional level, including a variety of gatherings, workshops, and readings. The Board has approved the addition of an online calendar connected to the website, to enhance the visibility of events throughout the state, and we are adding a "donate now" option to our website to encourage donations to help us grow and prosper. Before the conference, the Board also approved a new finance policy for the organization. We'll share more on these once they become active and accessible for all on the WFOP website, wfop.org.

We are also exploring ways to further fellowship, especially among new members, to include a new member orientation, critique groups, ride and room sharing opportunities for conference participation and a scholarship fund to support our members with limited

Meet Beth Ann Workmaster: Many years ago, before I gave poetry much thought besides the occasional appreciation, a friend of mine said, "You should be a poet." I asked her why and she elaborated that I often made seemingly odd comparisons and quirky observations. I wasn't sure at the time if I should take that as a compliment or not, but I laughed and shrugged it off and went on making seemingly odd comparisons and quirky observations. ### **2023 WFOP TRIAD POETRY CONTEST JUDGES**

POET'S CHOICE: **Ellie Schoenfeld** is the author of three collections of poetry including *The Dark Honey: New & Used Poems* (Clover Valley Press, 2009). Her work has appeared in an assortment of anthologies, small press journals, and on *The Writer's Almanac*. She was a co-founder of Poetry Harbor and served on the board of Spirit Lake Poetry Series. She has participated in many projects working with artists from various genres and worked with regional literary organizations on community poetry projects. She has been the grateful recipient of ARAC/McKnight fellowship grants and served as the 2016–2018 Duluth Poet Laureate.

THEME: **Daniel Khalastchi** is an Iraqi Jewish American. A graduate of the Iowa Writers' Workshop and a former fellow at the Fine Arts Work Center in Provincetown, he is the author of three previous books of poetry: *Manoleria* (Tupelo Press), *Tradition* (McSweeney's), and *American Parables* (University of Wisconsin Press, winner of the Brittingham Prize). His work has appeared in numerous publications, including *American Poetry Review, The Believer Logger, Colorado Review, Granta, The Iowa Review, the Jewish Book Council's Paper Brigade, and Best American Experimental Writing. ## More Tips for Punctuation and Grammar

Here are a few more tips about correct word usage to help your poems and any written communications. Often, a quick proofread will catch mistakes such as the use of the wrong word.

### Everyday/Every day

"Everyday," one word, is an adjective meaning "used or seen daily," or "ordinary." "She made writing an everyday practice." "Every day," two words, is an adverb phrase meaning "daily" or "every weekday." "They go to the barn twice every day to milk the cows." If you can put another word between "every" and "day," as in "every single day," then you want the two-word adverb.

### Farther/Further

"Farther" means "more" in a literal physical distance. "The deer ran farther into the woods." Use "further" for basically everything else that means "more," i.e., for abstractions like ideas or thoughts. Some people think farther and further are the same, but nothing could be further from the truth!

### Their/There/They're

"They're" is a contraction for "they are." "There" is used to mean "at that point" or "in that place." "Their" is the possessive form of the third-person plural pronoun "they" meaning "belonging to them." "We're sitting in their chairs."

### Your/You're

"You're" is a contraction for "you are." "You're one of my favorite poets." "Your" is a possessive pronoun meaning "belonging to you." "Your poems are delightful."

#### 2023 WFOP TRIAD POETRY CONTEST RULES

- 1. Contestant must be a current WFOP member in good standing (dues current).
- 2. There is no entry fee. Do not send SASE. Entries will not be returned.
- 3. Contest opens on **June 1**. Entries must be *emailed* by **Septmber 1**. Snail mail entries will be accepted from people who have no access to email; deadline for *snail mail* is **August 23** because the poems will have to be retyped into the file going to the judges. **PLEASE DO NOT SNAIL MAIL IF YOU HAVE EMAIL!**
- 4. Enter only one original, unpublished poem in each category. To clarify: "published" includes any print or electronic presentation except copies of drafts shared with critique groups. The same poem may not be entered in more than one category. Categories are on the Entry Form. Theme: What Could've, Would've, or Should've Been If...
- 5. Manuscript must be typed on 8½"x11" white paper, one side only, one poem to a page. **Type the category in the upper left corner**. Writer's name should **NOT** appear on the page with the poem. Please do not center poems. Fonts will be standardized before poems are sent to judges. Put poems in body of email, or attach .doc or .docx in case of unusual formatting.
- 6. Send the poems together in one email to jjohannes?@gmail.com. The subject line should read: "Triad Entry from Last name, First name." In the email body, include your name, address, email address, phone, the category, title and first line of each poem, and the following statement: "I am a current WFOP member. The poetry submitted is my original, unpublished work not under consideration elsewhere. If I am entering the Emerging Poet category, I meet the criteria."
- 7. Only the winners will be notified by mail. The winners' names will be posted on **wfop.org** and included in the *Museletter* following the judges' decisions.
- 8. The First Place winner in each category will be ineligible to enter that category the following year.
- 9. Prizes will be awarded only if there are sufficient entries and the judge determines that an entry warrants an award.
- 10. Sorry, but WFOP cannot accept responsibility for lost manuscripts, and there will be no notification if an entry is disqualified for failure to follow the rules. Author retains all rights to their work.
- 11. Please do not post your entries on your webpage until after the contest has been judged.
