THE TRAD CONTESTOPENS June 1st and closes September 1st. The Poets' Choice and Theme categories are open to WFOP members only, but a change this year makes it possible for nonmembers to enter The Kay Saunders Memorial Emerging Poet category as long as they meet the other criteria listed in the guidelines.

This year's theme is ekphrastic poetry, which is poetry inspired by the visual arts. WFOP is collaborating with the Milwaukee Art Museum (MAM) by encouraging poets to write poems about works in its permanent "narrative" collection. Complete instructions for accessing the artwork are available in the guidelines and on the website.

The judges are **Bruce Bennett**, author of ten books of poetry and more than thirty chapbooks; **Lorette C. Luzajic**, who reads, writes, publishes, edits, and teaches ekphrastic fiction and poetry and whose art-inspired work has been published in hundreds of journals; and **Lois Baer Barr**, whose chapbook *Biopoesis* won first prize at *Poetica* and whose *Tracks: Poems on the "L"* was a finalist at Finishing Line Press. TRIAD POETRY CONTEST RULES

Deadline: September 1, 2024

- 1. Poet must be a current WFOP member in good standing (dues current) to enter Poets' Choice and Theme. The Kay Saunders Memorial Emerging Poet category is open to members and nonmembers.
- 2. There is no entry fee.
- 3. Contest opens on June 1st. Entries must be emailed by September 1st. Snail mail entries will be accepted from people who have no access to email; deadline for snail mail is August 23rd because the poems will have to be retyped into the email file going to the judges. Include the information listed in 6. **PLEASE DO NOT SNAIL MAIL IF YOU HAVE EMAIL!** Mailing address: Jeffrey Johannes, 800 Ver Bunker Avenue Port Edwards, WI 54469.
- 4. Poet may enter only one original, unpublished poem (75 line maximum) in each category. To clarify: "Published includes any print or electronic presentation except copies of drafts shared with critique groups." The same poem may not be entered in more than one category. Categories are described below.
- 5. Type the category in the upper left corner of each poem and **include the poems in the body of a single email.** *Please do not center your poems.* All fonts will be standardized before the poems are mailed to the judges. **Attachments will not be opened.**
- 6. Send the poems in a single email to jjohannes7@ gmail.com. The subject line should read: "Triad Entry from Last name, First name." The body of your single email should include your name, address, email address, phone number, title and first line of each poem, along with the category in which it is entered, and the following statement from members: "I am a current WFOP member. The poetry submitted is my original, unpublished work not under consideration elsewhere. If I am entering the Emerging Poet category, I meet the criteria." Nonmembers entering just the Emerging Poet category should include the following statement with their entry: "I am not a current WFOP member. The poetry submitted is my original, unpublished work not under consideration elsewhere. I meet the Emerging Poet criteria."

Make sure you include the following information:

- Poet's name
- Postal address
- Email
- Phone
- Theme (Ekphrastic poem from the on-line narrative collection of MAM): Title of poem and first line (see specific instructions on next page)
 - Poet's Choice: Title of poem and first line
 - Kay Saunders Emerging Poet: Title of poem and first line (see eligibility rules below)
 - Statement of originality and eligibility

Please do **not** send poems as an attachment! Attachments will not be opened.

- 7. You will receive a return email acknowledging that your poems have arrived. The winners will be notified in the fall. The names and the poems of winners who give permission will be posted on the WFOP website and included in the *Museletter*.
- 8. The first-place winner in each category will be ineligible to enter that category the following year.
- 9. Prizes will be awarded only if there are sufficient entries and the contest judge determines that an entry warrants an award.
- 10. Please do not post your entries on your webpage until after the contest has been judged and awards presented.
- 11. For each category below, prizes are \$100, \$50, \$30. Each poem should not exceed 75 lines.

Kay Saunders Emerging Poet: This category is reserved for emerging poets, those poets who may have started to publish their poetry and/or participate in workshops and classes but have not won 1st place in a contest as an adult. Emerging Poets can also submit to the other two categories if they are WFOP members. Nonmembers entering the Emerging Poet category are ineligible for the other categories.

Poets' Choice: Open subject/form, open to WFOP members only.

Theme: Ekphrastic poetry from the Narrative Theme section of the Milwaukee Art Museum online collection, open to WFOP members only (information below and on the website).

How to Enter in the Theme Category

This year's theme is ekphrastic poetry, which is poetry inspired by the visual arts. We are collaborating with the Milwaukee Art Museum (MAM) by encouraging poets to write poems about works in its permanent "narrative" collection.

If you are interested in submitting an ekphrastic poem to the 2024 Triad Contest, please follow these steps:

- 1. Go to the narrative collection area on the museum website: https://collection.mam.org/themes/narrative.php
- 2. Select an artwork. These works "tell a story with subjects ranging from epic battles and eventful journeys to everyday scenes. Sources of inspiration include history, literature, mythology, religion, and direct observation of the world."
- 3. Notice that the first page of artwork contains only images 1 to 20 of the 144 images available. Click 2, 3, 4, etc. to view more works in this collection area.
- 4. Once you find an artwork, you can enlarge the image by clicking on it. Clicking on the image will also give you more information, including if the art is currently available for view, useful if you are interested and able to view the actual artwork. If you cannot go to the museum, the information will give you a starting point for research.
- 5. Please include the name of the artwork, artist's name, and page number in your title or subtitle so the judge and/or Triad chairpersons can find it if they would like.

The excellent workshop Barbara Crooker presented for WFOP, "The Art of Writing About Art," is available for playback on our workshop page if you would like ideas for getting started with this kind of writing.

I'm also a student at UW–Green Bay completing the Writing & Applied Arts BFA; however, I'm what they consider a "non-traditional" student as I'm 35 years old and returning to college after quite a long hiatus! After I complete my BFA, I hope to go on to complete an MFA in poetry.

I wanted to get involved with WFOP because it's been on my radar screen for quite a long time.
